Mr. Sousa, the famous bandmaster, has a book in Messrs. Ward, Lock, and Co.'s hands entitled "The Fifth String."

"Anther's Way" is the title of Adeline Sargeant's new book (Methuen and Co.).

"The Hypocrite," one of Mr. Ranger Gull's (Greening and Co.) best books is in the seventh edition.

Mrs. Craigie (says the "Literary World") is still in India and busy with her new book, "The Vineyard," which deals with life in a modern provincial town. Mrs. Craigie says: "Some readers may be glad that it contains no metaphysics."

Mr. Arthur Lynch, now under penal servitude for life for treason, has written some fair books. Amongst them are: "A Koran of Love, and Other Poems," "Human Documents," "Our Poets," "Modern Authors: A Review and a Forecast," and a novel, "Approaches: The Poor Scholar's Quest of a Mecca."

Mr. Fisher Unwin has issued a translation by Miss Johanna Volz of Nietzsche's "Morgenrothe" ("Dawn of Day"). This will be the fourth volume of the complete English edition of Nietzsche, which is in course of publication. In the preface to the "Dawn of Day" the author speaks of himself as "one who works in the bowels of the earth, boring, mining, undermining."
